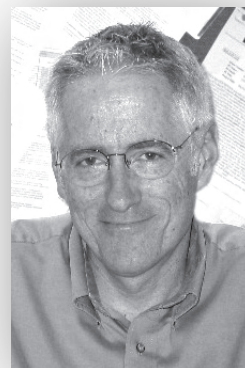
This is my last column as division president. It has been an honor to serve as your president this past year. Alan Budney will succeed me, which means the presidency will be in very capable hands next year.

APA awards were also given to two fellows of our division: Hendree Jones received the Award for Distinguished Scientific Early Career Contribution to Psychology for her outstanding research in the areas of perinatal addictions and women's health, and Morgan Sammons received the Award for Distinguished Professional Contributions to Practice in the Private Sector for his leadership in advancing psychology's prescriptive authority agenda in the United States. I'd also like to acknowledge the contributions of two scientists who happen to work at the same institution, The University of Rochester. Ron Wood, as Electronics Communica-

APA COUNCIL REPORT: AUGUST 2005

The summer Council meeting held at the annual convention in Washington, D.C., was my last in a 6-year term of service. I want to thank the Division for giving me the opportunity to serve on Council and to observe first hand the mission and methods of APA governance. I also look forward to turning the position over to my successor, Nancy Ator, who I know will do an extremely competent job in representing the Division at Council.

The American Psychological Association serves a vital role, defining the scope and practice of psychology, keeping the contributions of psychologists in the public eye, integrating science and practice within the profession, and providing advocacy for science, practice, education, and public policy issues.

The APA governance process, which I have come to understand, is designed to provide a thorough and thoughtful consideration of relevant issues and to result in sound decisions being made on behalf of the organization and its members. The Council has the responsibility for overseeing the budget and expenditures of APA, for hiring and evaluating the CEO, and for setting the agenda, mission, and policy of the organization.

The sound management of APA as an organization is reflected in the work of the superb individuals who have been selected to lead various facets of the organization, including Norman Anderson, the current CEO, Jack McKay, CFO, and Russell Newman, Steven Breckler, Cynthia Belar, and Henry Tomes, who head

the Practice, Science, Education, and Public Policy Directorates, respectively. The current exciting initiatives of the Science Directorate, which are central to the interests of Division 28, are presented in a separate report in this newsletter.

Finances of the organization are currently quite sound. A budget excess of approximately \$500,000 is projected for both this year and next. APA has long maintained a large scientific publications operation whose sales constitute a primary income source. This continues to be the case, although the bulk of sales has shifted largely from print to electronic products. Sale of electronic publications and related products (e.g. Psych Abstracts) constitutes about 66 percent of the organization's income. The second main income source is derived from leasing space in the two buildings owned by the organization. Dues, which will be increasing by \$8 next year, constitute a smaller portion of income. In an experiment undertaken by the organization to boost membership, student members can continue to receive a substantial and prolonged dues reduction over their first eight years of membership.

A new financial benefit will be coming to APA in the form of a tax abatement on their properties that has been promised by the District of Columbia. In return, APA will hold its annual convention meeting every third year in D.C. This should be

no hardship on the membership, as Washington offers a very pleasant and convenient meeting venue.

Division 28 is primarily a science division. Nevertheless, it came to my attention during this meeting that our division, in collaboration with our sister Division 50, has in fact been very instrumental in promoting the integration of science and practice within the organization. Most notably, members of the division have contributed their talents in the past to work on special task forces that produced training and testing curricula for practitioners who wish to document their competency in our specialty subject areas. Remarkably, the Psychopharmacology Education Proficiency and the Substance Abuse Treatment Certification programs are the only proficiency and certification programs currently offered through the APA Practice Directorate. This reflects the timeliness and vital importance of these topic areas within psychology and is a tribute to the division members who contribute to these organizational initiatives. The division should be very proud of its contribution to strengthening the science-practice interface within APA.



NEW NOMINATIONS REQUESTED FOR DIVISION 28 FELLOWS

Each year, the Executive Committee seeks new nominations for Fellow status in Division 28. Any member who has made outstanding contributions to psychopharmacology or substance abuse is eligible. As a guide for you to determine if somebody you are thinking of nominating fits the criteria for Fellow status, here is a list that APA, as well as our division, considers when going through applications. Note that these are minimum standards under the APA Bylaws, so the potential candidate must meet all of these criteria:

1. The receipt of a doctoral degree based in part on a psychological dissertation, or from a program primarily psychological in nature.
2. Prior membership as an APA member for at least one year and a member of Division 28.
3. Active engagement at the time of nomination in the advancement of psychology in any of its aspects

In 2005, fifty \$300 awards were presented to students for travel to convention. Finally, in previous years, APA/APAGS members who were first authors on convention presentations have had their registration fees waived. More information on these opportunities will be posted via the listserv and future newsletters as they are announced.

Two Faculty Positions, College of Public Health, University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences, Little Rock

The UAMS College of Public Health invites applications for two open-rank, tenure-track positions related to tobacco at the assistant, associate, or full professor level. (1) The first will be a joint position between the Arkansas Division of Health (ADH) and the UAMS College of Public Health. This position will lead and oversee the ADH tobacco prevention and treatment programs and help determine the future direction of tobacco related services in the State (estimated budget of \$17 million). Arkansas is the only state continuing to devote its Master Settlement Agreement funding to health-related issues, part of which funds the ADH tobacco activities, bringing Arkansas up to CDC recommended levels of funding. We seek applicants with strong leadership ability and demonstrated skills in program development and administration, as well as experience in tobacco cessation treatment and prevention. Applicants should also have research and teaching interests involving tobacco and/or nicotine. Physicians are encouraged to apply. (2) The second position is for a faculty member with interests in the economic, legal, and/or socio-cultural forces that affect tobacco policy, prevention, and treatment. Individuals with strong research expertise in primary tobacco prevention research, or behavior, finance, decision analysis, health economics, and rural health related to tobacco dependence are encouraged to apply. Both positions would be expected to participate in the Center for Addiction Research at UAMS.

Applicants for both positions should have a doctoral degree in one of the relevant social, health, or management sciences. A strong record of research publications and extramural funding, or evidence of the ability to develop such a record, is also required. Experience in teaching at the graduate level and engaging in research translation and public service is also highly desirable. Successful applicants will become part of a recently established but rapidly growing college with a public mandate to conduct education and research supporting health improvement.

The newly accredited College of Public Health was created in 2001 with a portion of the state's tobacco settlement funds. The College enjoys close relationships with the state's health and human service agencies (particularly the ADH) and the UAMS Colleges of Medicine, Pharmacy, Nursing, and Health Related Professions.
