From the President's Desk...

Having used the last column to advocate the values of APA and Division 28 membership, I thought I would use this one to give you a pot pourri of some of the things we've done for you lately!

Examiners to Raise Questions—As many of you will remember, APA Council voted last August to authorize the College of Professional Psychology (CPP) to prepare an examination to be available to states that grant prescriptive authority to psychologists. Division presidents were asked to nominate individuals to be considered for the expert panel to oversee this effort. In January, the final expert panel was selected, with the goal of broad representation of areas of expertise of various sorts. Division 28 liaison to CPP, Maxine Stitzer, participated in this meeting in Washington. One consideration in assembling this panel was that a potential conflict of interest be avoided by not including individuals who have been active in the curriculum development efforts of the Education Directorate. The final slate of members of the core expert panel is an illustrious one (and 7 are members of Division 28):

As Vicki Vandever, Chair of CPP, wrote, they "will play a central role in defining a knowledge domain in psychopharmacology that is appropriate for testing and in developing a valid examination to test for that knowledge."

History Comes to an End—Herbert Barry, III, who served as Centennial Officer for Division 28, completed compilation and editing of a history of Division 28. It is based on interviews, carried out over several years by members of the Division, with founders of the Division and past presidents. The history is a chapter in Volume II of *Unification Through Division: Histories of the Divisions of the American Psychological Association*, edited by Donald A. Dewsbury, published by APA Books (\$24.95).

Research Survives Smoke-filled Rooms—In last month's column, I emphasized how APA's Public Policy Office monitors legislation of relevance to psychology researchers. This past couple of months, Geoff Mumford, the Legislative & Federal Affairs Officer for APA (and a behavioral pharmacologist by training) has had his hands full keeping track of the "tobacco settlement" bill (S1415). As this goes to press, the bill has been approved by the members of the Commerce Committee and gone to the full Senate for a vote. Geoff devoted his attention to advocating for continued focus on behavioral research, which seems fitting. Behavioral pharmacology research has played an important role in the unfolding of the country's understanding of nicotine dependence. (In my recollection, it was the speaking out by two behavioral pharmacologists employed by tobacco companies that was a critical element

in initiation of investigation of the tobacco companies.) Research on all aspects of dependence on tobacco products continues to be important, as is research on all the health consequences of smoking. The specific mechanism and wording of the current legislation was first in a bill sponsored by a member of the Labor Committee. Geoff worked to see that the language was not lost in the transfer of the legislation to the Commerce Committee. The bill includes a provision to establish a National Tobacco Task Force within Health and Human Services and a dedicated funding stream to be administered by an Office of Tobacco Related Research. In a report Geoff posted on the Division 28 email bulletin board, he made the point that the effort was a science advocacy success due to partnering with the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids through a coalition designated ENACT, which includes, among others, the College on Problems of Drug Dependence, the Society for Research on Nicotine and Tobacco, and the Society for Behavioral Medicine. Geoff wrote, "Within the larger public health community we represented a minority interested in prevention, addiction and treatment. But we worked hard to make the distinction between our public health issues and those of the larger public health community interested in the secondary consequences of chronic tobacco use. We combined the best elements of our individual policy statements to forge a unified document describing: the rationale for promoting a research agenda; how to fund research; how to administer a research fund; what type of research to fund; and what to do with research results." More on this appears elsewhere in this newsletter.

Enquiring Minds Want to Know—Beth Azar, science reporter with the *APA Monitor*, contacted the division presidents to say that the *Monitor* is trying to do more outreach to APA members and divisions to make sure they're covering the issues and research that are of interest. She is going to keep in touch with certain science divisions in particular and plans to touch base once a month to see if there are ideas for good research story ideas (new areas of research, investigators who are doing really interesting work, theoretical controversies that are brewing, and policy stories). Jim Zacny, our Public Information Officer, will be her contact for Division 28. If you have some ideas you would like Jim to keep in mind, be sure to pass them along. Part of his role will be to suggest the best sources to call for information and quotes on particular issues. So if Beth Azar calls you saying "Jim Zacny suggested you are familiar with research . . ." I hope you will be able to help!

Div 28 Web Site Weaves a Spell—HMS Beagle is an on-line biomedical journal. Division 28's home page (http://www.apa.org/divisions/div_28) was chosen as HMS Beagle's "Web Pick of the Day" on February 19. HMS Beagle characterizes itself as "a webzine" for biological and medical researchers, with a daily digest of the highest quality Web resources and published material. Here is how they described our web site: "APA Division of Psychopharmacology and Substance Abuse - a directory of psychopharmacologists, tools for finding funding through the APA and NIH, information on the print journal *Experimental and Clinical Psychopharmacology*, and reprints of select drug regulation legislation." Congratulations and thanks to Ron Wood, our Electronic Information Officer, for establishing this web site and for his efforts to keep it updated! Testing, Testing—Division 28 is being provided the opportunity to comment on two separate initiatives in the Science Directorate: First we were asked to give feedback on a revision of the *Standards for Educational and Psychological Testing*, which has been prepared by a joint committee of representatives from APA, the American Educational Research Association, and the National Council on Measurement in Education. The Executive Committee was polled for interest in this. Nancy Piotrowski, this year's program chair, volunteered to review the document and provide comments because it is directly relevant to her own research. Another request of a similar nature came in shortly after, and Nancy Piotrowski has agreed to handle this as well. She now is the Division 28 representative to review draft reports of the Task Force on Test User Qualifications. The charge of this task force is to develop a policy on that clarifies requirements and conditions for responsible test use, reflects the diverse positions of the APA constituency, and codifies these into a policy that Council can endorse and adopt as the official policy of APA. Members of Division 28 who are interested in the progress of these initiatives should contact her.

Executive Decisions—In March, I was fortunate enough to have a critical mass of currently active Division 28 officers, including President-elect Steve Higgins, in DC within the same 24-hour period; and we were able to have a mini-executive committee meeting. (Others participating were Jane Acri, Dave Penetar, Marilyn Carroll, and Alice Young.) We went over several issues important to the functioning of the Division: finances, membership, functions that need coverage, and the by-laws. In 2002 (just around the corner!), APA will begin a Review of Divisions based, in part, on by-laws, annual reports for the past 5 years, etc. Our by-laws definitely are ready for updating. Some changes will facilitate the work of the Division (e.g., delineating responsibilities of officers better) and some will bring the by-laws in line with current practices (e.g., we now have two people rather than one responsible for Membership and New Fellows). In the next newsletter, the proposed changes to the by-laws will be published. Voting will occur at the annual business meeting at the convention in San Francisco.

The Ballots are Boxed—And Speaking of Voting! For APA members, the opportunity to vote for Division Officers will arrive from APA in your mail in April. Candidates for President-Elect of Division 28 are Marilyn Carroll and Carolyn Mazure. We are electing one new member-at-large, and the candidates are Chris-Ellyn Johanson and Cora Lee Wetherington. Be sure your ballot gets to APA by June 1.

Be Conventional—Get the reservation forms for the 1998 convention in San Francisco out of the *American Psychologist*! See the program elsewhere in this newsletter. Nancy Piotrowski tells me the Division 28 Hospitality Suite will be open for business Friday, August 14. Hope to see you there!

Mid-Year Council Report

Alice Young, Ph.D.

By a slim margin, Division 28 retained its seat on Council for 1999. Council seats are apportioned by a special ballot mailed to all APA members in early November. Each member has 10 points to allocate among Divisions and State/Provincial Associations. As you can see from the table below, Division 28 received a skewed distribution of votes, lots of votes worth 1-point, and smaller peaks of 2-point, 5-point, and 10-point votes.

Our skewed voting pattern has been steady for years. The rules by which APA members elect the Council have just changed, however. Council is getting bigger. In late 1997, APA members approved a bylaw amendment that changes the Council membership. As described in an article in the February 1998 APA Monitor, the approved "wild card" plan will distribute an extra 48 seats to divisions and state/provincial associations in 1999. As a result the total number of Council members will rise to about 150 (the number varies each year). The new seats will go first to any divisions or state/provincial associations that do not receive a seat in the yearly apportionment balloting. Any leftover seats will be given to the units that come the closest to earning an additional seat in the balloting.

The new wild-card plan means that every vote counts! Under the new plan, divisions received 29 of the 48 new seats in 1999, whereas state associations received 19. AND, many of the divisions receiving wild card seats were members of CASAP, the Council's Coalition for Academic, Scientific, and Applied Psychology. CASAP member divisions that received one or more of the new seats are divisions 7 (Developmental), 8 (The Society of Personality and Social Psychology), 9 (Society for the Psychological Study of Social Issues), 12 (Clinical), 14 (The Society for Industrial and Organizational Psychology), 26 (History of Psychology), 29 (Psychotherapy), 32 (Humanistic), 36 (Psychology of Religion), 38 (Health), 40 (Clinical Neuropsychology), 41 (The American Psychology-Law Society), 47 (Exercise and Sport), 49 (Group), and 51 (The Society for the Psychological Study of Men and Masculinity). [FOOTNOTE]

Sadly, Division 28 was not among those receiving an additional seat in the new plan. In fact, we kept our seat ONLY because of the wildcard plan. The message? OPEN the apportionment ballot when it comes, VOTE-10 for Division 28, and MAIL the ballot back to APA!
